Protecting Your Animals on

Celebrating July 4th is Fun for People, but Not for Your Pets

Save Our Strays recommends:

- Keep your pet in a safe; quiet place...their hearing is much more sensitive than ours. For pets who become nervous or upset, consult a veterinarian about tranquilizers. The vet will prescribe according to weight, age and condition of the pet. It is important to consult a veterinarian because tranquilizers can overdose or become toxic when combined with other medications, flea collars or sprays.
- ID Tags and current license tags with home phone number and an alternate phone number (including area codes) are important at all times, but especially during the 4th of July holidays. Consider a microchip. If you are a resident of Huntington Beach, Save Our Strays low-cost program offers them for only \$5. It cannot fall off and most shelters and animal control officers have scanners.

More pets are lost at this time of the year than any other. They are often hit by cars, never make it back home or are destroyed at shelters because their owners don't show up in time or at the right shelter to claim them.

If you have lost or found a pet:

- Put up signs, pass out flyers and place ads. All found ads are free and some lost ads are too. Place ads in the OC Register, LA Times, Pennysaver and any other community papers.
- Go to shelters, EVERY DAY, if possible.
- Have pictures and description details available.

Does Your Cat Scratch the Furniture?

Scratching is a perfectly natural and necessary behavior that helps cats remove the outer layer of their claws. Also, by leaving claw marks and the scent of their paws behind, they are marking territory and claiming the surface as their own.

Sometimes people resort to declawing their cat as a quick fix solution to the scratching problem. This is a painful procedure that removes the cat's toes as well as his claws, causing permanent damage to his feet. Declawed cats can also develop other behavioral problems-like biting and avoiding the litter box.

Fortunately, positive reinforcement training is a humane alternative that can also be fun for you and your cat. With training and the addition if a proper scratching post, this can be an easy problem to solve. Our goal is to redirect this natural behavior and teach kitty to claim the appropriate surface.

You need only 4 things to begin training: a scratching post, some treats, a clicker and ...a cat!

There are a variety of scratching posts that can be purchased at a pet supply or online. I recommend acquiring one with a scratching surface that doesn't resemble the carpeting on your floor or the upholstery on your couch. This will help eliminate any confusion for kitty. I like the pressed cardboard variety with catnip included. The catnip can be sprinkled on the surface, filtering down between the cardboard pieces. The added catnip bonus will help attract the cat to the surface. However, every cat is an individual so you may have to try a few different varieties to see what works best for your cat.

First- place the new scratching post near the area the cat has been scratching. Kitty will probably investigate the new post on his own. Click when he approaches and toss a treat near the scratching post. Reinforce him with your voice and offer a quick pet. You can also rub cat's paws on the post leaving his scent and encouraging him to use it in the future. If he doesn't approach it on his own you can help him along by simply picking him up, putting him down by the post and handing him a treat.

Do this a few times (I recommend short 5-minute sessions) and then go back to your day, but use your peripheral vision to monitor your cat's activities. Keep your clicker and

treats handy so you can easily reinforce him if he approaches the post or uses it.

When he heads for the furniture instead, stomp your foot, say "No" and put a treat on the scratching post, encouraging him over to it. Or say "No", pick him up and place him on the post, then praise, pet, click and feed.

Perhaps you already have a scratching post-or several- and your cat still chooses to scratch elsewhere. You may want to remove the old scratching posts and offer a different variety, adding one or more additional surfaces, along with applying these reconditioning techniques.

Be consistent. Even though you can't be watching your cat, be sure to reinforce him appropriately every time you can see him scratching. Over time you will see this behavior begin to change in your favor.

Our thoughts and prayers go out to the families and pets of these very special people. The animal community has lost some truly good friends.


The Easter Bunny Comes to Town
