# Pancake Breakfast in the Park 12th Annual Fundraiser – September 29, 2012





### **Save Our Strays to the Rescue**

On a recent visit to Beach Blvd. Pet Hospital with one of her kitties, President of Save Our Strays, Karen Chepeka, was approached by one of the staff regarding an adorable gray and white, 6 week old, kitten. The kitten had been found wandering in their neighborhood and they were searching for a new home. Knowing that Karen was involved in animal rescue, they were hoping she might know someone looking for a new addition to their home. The kitten was well

socialized and just a love bug. The veterinary office had named him Rigsby.

Karen reached out to the rescue community in search of a foster home for this darling. With the help of SOS volunteer Pam Meadows, a suitable foster was found. While on the



way to the foster home, Karen stopped by the home of her friend, Rhonda Godbehere, to show her the precious baby. Rhonda, being a feline lover, immediately fell in love with Rigsby. However, before a final decision was made to adopt, she wanted to discuss it with her family.

Rigsby arrived at his foster home a short time later and met another foster kitten there. She was a teeny, tiny, black and white kitten who had been found by a rescuer under the pier in Huntington Harbour. Her back right foot had been severely injured, likely a burn, and was all swollen and had been stitched up by a veterinarian. She was missing the claw in one of her toes. Given all that, she was a feisty little girl and gave Rigsby a piece of her mind. It didn't take long before they were fast friends.

The following day, after discussion with the family, Rhonda was ready to welcome Rigsby into her home. With great anticipation, Karen and Rhonda drove to the foster home to bring home the new addition.

Well, I guess you can figure out what happened from there. Upon meeting the little girl, there was no question that both kittens had a new home with the Godbeheres. It couldn't have been a better result for both these babies and the new family. Rigbsy and his new sister, now called Ariel (because she was found under a pier), are enjoying the good life with lots of love and attention. While not all situations turn out this well, we can celebrate the fact that these two were a couple of the lucky ones.

Save Our Strays offered to cover the cost of the spaying and neutering when this pair is old enough, as well as the cost of any ongoing care for Ariel's foot. While her foot may be permanently deformed, you wouldn't know it by way these two tear around their new home.

### **Is It Normal For My Cat to Vomit?**

If you have a cat, you may have accepted frequent vomiting as just one of those things that cats do because they're cats. While there can be many causes, none of them are considered "normal". But how do you know if something is serious or simply something they ate?

### What's Causing the Upchuck?

Figuring out why your cat is vomiting frequently is harder than it may seem. That's largely because there are many possible causes. Chronic vomiting can be the result of ulcers, some forms of cancer, gastritis, liver or kidney failure, pancreatitis, inner ear disease, hyperthyroidism, ingestion of foreign objects, bladder obstruction, or feline panleukopenia virus - to name a few. But even seemingly healthy cats can develop frequent vomiting. Food intolerances, eating plants or paper, and ingesting hair can all lead to it.

While it sounds gross, you should note the contents, frequency, time of day, and any association with eating. These observations can help your veterinarian determine the cause or what testing is needed. Vomiting within a few minutes of eating is often regurgitation and slowing your cat's eating is generally the solution.

### **Another Culprit**

After ruling out or treating other causes of gastrointestinal disease, inflammation of the intestines should be considered. What happens is that intestinal walls get thickened, sometimes twice as thick as normal, which can impair absorption of nutrients and cause weight loss in advanced cases. More likely, the intestinal thickening affects the ability of the intestinal walls to contract properly and move intestinal contents from the stomach to the colon. As partially digested food and swallowed hair build up in the intestines, more recently eaten food is vomited.

A study at Alamo Feline Health Center in San Antonio, Texas, showed that intestinal inflammation is a common culprit in vomiting cats. In the study, 94 vomiting cats that had intestinal biopsies performed, only one cat's biopsy was normal. The other 93 cats had significant intestinal inflammation associated with their frequent vomiting.

The two main causes of this inflammation are inflammatory bowel disease (IBD) and lymphoma. Treatment of IBD involves a diet change and anti-inflammatory drugs. In some cases, probiotics and vitamin B12 are prescribed as well. Although not curable, treatment can stop the vomiting and diarrhea, and reverse the weight loss. It's important to address IBD, as the disease can become debilitating and may lead to lymphoma.

Treatment of lymphoma, involving chemotherapy, is more complicated, but can also be successfully treated in many cases. Therefore, letting your veterinarian do the needed biopsies sooner rather than later is strongly encouraged.

### **Dogs and Dirt-time**

It's all about you and your dog and brings in a little science and nature as a bonus. It's about dogs, disturbance and dirt-time.

We as humans get upset sometimes. It happens to all of us. We get upset with other drivers, we get upset with our spouses, we get upset with our neighbors, our kids, and yes, even our dogs. For whatever reason, we get upset. Then we come home and hang out with our furry 4-legged friends, and eventually we calm down. Do you ever wonder how that calming down thing happens? Well, our 4-legged friends often download our disturbance into their own bodies because they love us so much. So in effect, they discharge our disturbance for us, and we feel better – and calmer. It's a simple energy exchange (emotion, including any disturbance, is a form of energy).

So then what happens? Well, if your dog (or cat or other pet) doesn't have a way to discharge the energy out of their own bodies, that disturbance doesn't have anywhere to go. No, it doesn't come out as bad behavior in most cases. It actually gets stored in their physical bodies, and over time, if it doesn't get discharged, it can create all kinds of problems – diseases and physical health problems.

So how do you discharge that disturbance from their bodies? It's very simple actually. Take them outside for some dirt-time. Animals, including the most fru-fru, hoity-toity of dogs, are part of nature. They need dirt-time and more that just a squat on the grass to relieve themselves. They need regular outside time to sniff around, roll in the grass, watch squirrels, chase bugs, exercise and just hang out. Even better if you're out there with them, shoes off in the grass or sitting under a tree. Because then you've discharged yourself! The earth is amazing. It can take all the disturbance from ourselves and our animals and completely neutralize it for us. By neutralizing it in this way, all this disturbance doesn't create so much disease in our own bodies or in our dogs' bodies. How cool is that!
